Transfer Coursework Restriction: At least 50% of a student's Arts and Sciences (ARSC) major or minor must be taken at the University of Arkansas.

GPA (Grade Point Average): Every student must have at least a 2.00 cumulative grade point average to be eligible to graduate from the University of Arkansas.

BFA Applications: Students are required to apply to and be accepted the BFA through a separate process within the school of art. Prior to acceptance, students will be declared PSTAR, Pre-Studio Art BFA. Applications are typically made in the third semester of the major (or the first semester taking ARTS 3000 level classes after completing ARTS 1919/1929).
