## LANGUAGE REQUIREMENT

6-18 hrs

Take **6 hours of 3000-level or higher** modern world <u>language</u> <u>instruction</u> in one of the following languages: **Arabic**,

French, Portuguese, or Spanish. This requirement cannot be fulfilled with 3 credits in one language and three credits in another language. Students may meet this requirement with the study of other languages with permission of the International and Global Studies director. (Courses need to be taught wholly or mostly in the language to count.)\*\*

This may be completed by taking only 6 hrs of 30000 level courses, if the student has previous fluency, but is most commonly completed by taking six classes (ARAB and CHIN both also offer intensive formats for accelerated study):
