

ASSISTANT PROFESSOR IN CLINICAL PSYCHOLOGY

The Department of Psychological Science at the University of Arkansas invites applications for a tenure-track appointment at the rank of Assistant Professor in CLINICAL psychology. Appointment is set to begin August 2016. We are open to all research areas, but especially encourage applications from scholars whose research addresses multicultural issues/health disparities or focuses on children and families. A competitive startup package is available. Successful applicants must have (1) a PhD from an APA-accredited Clinical or Counseling Psychology program and be license-eligible in the state of Arkansas; (2) a record of scholarship or professional development that will advance diversity in teaching, research, or service, consistent with the campus strategic plan (<http://diversity.uark.edu/>); (3) an outstanding record of research achievement and evidence of, or demonstrated potential for, external funding; (4) a strong commitment to both graduate-level training and undergraduate instruction; and (5) demonstrated effective interpersonal skills and collegiality. Ability to teach a graduate course in evidence-based therapy is preferred.
