Students are encouraged to plan ahead and choose their 2000 level COMM classes to correspond with the pre-requisites to the 3000+ level classes they plan to take. Pre-requisites are listed in <a href="#">course descriptions</a> in the catalog.</p> <p>COMM 399T and 499T (and up to 3 hrs of COMM 299T) transfer courses count in this category as long as students still meet the 50% rule. Not all 99T classes pull into the degree audit automatically, so students may need to request classes be moved into the minor by their academic advisor.</p> <p><u>Internship in Communication:</u> COMM 4913 Internship in Communication is an elective option, and it may be repeated for up to 6 hours of degree credit.
