## **Psychological Sciences Department Information:**

Transfer Coursework Note: It's important Psychology majors pay attention to how classes transfer to UA. For example, a 2000 level developmental psychology course taken at another school cannot count for Developmental psychology here, which is a 3000-level course, but it might be able to count as a PSYC elective. Additionally, some classes that were coded as Psychology classes at a previous school will transfer here to the HDFS department and don't count in the major.

Additional Note: During the Spring 2020, Fall 2020, and Spring 2021 semesters many schools had the option to turn D or C grades into P (Pass) grades that did not impact GPA. The department has determined that any P grades (including TP, Transfer Pass) can count in the major. This is only for the three semesters outlined in this policy, and P grades from any other semester are ineligible.

PSYC GPA Requirement: *In addition to the university GPA requirements, psychology majors must have a C or higher on all PSYC and MATH courses for their major. **In addition, a 2.0 GPA is required in all PSYC courses taken.*** (Note: while D grades in PSYC or MATH classes may count as general electives, this may not be reflected in the audit due to rules in the major. If a student wants a D grade in a PSYC or MATH class to count somewhere outside the major, they may need to request this change to the degree audit from their academic advisor.)

Note About Enrollment: The psychology major is a very popular program. For this reason, all PSYC classes typically fill within the first three weeks of Advanced Registration. Students should always plan to register on their assigned enrollment date and pay close attention to emails from the department that outline waitlist procedures.
