- 2. Pass JOUR 11000 Grammar Spelling Punctuation Requirement with a Satisfactory (S) grade by scoring a 75% or better on the GSP test that is administered through the class.

(Once you officially declare a Journalism major or minor you will obtain access to the GSP Blackboard course for Option 2. Students who do not complete both the GSP requirement and JOUR 10303 with a C or better cannot enroll in any courses for which JOUR 10303 is a prerequisite.
