Program Information:

BFA Application Process: Students must apply to and be accepted to a BFA in graphic design through the school of art. (Prior to acceptance, they will be declared PDES, Pre-Graphic Design BFA.) Students must be enrolled in or done with ARTS 1929 to apply. Applications to the program occur once a year in the spring. More information about the application process can be found at the school of art [website](#).

Graduation Timeline: The graphic design is a highly sequenced and cohort driven program that has 8 semesters of required classes. This major cannot be completed in fewer than 8 semesters.

Students Transferring from NWACC with an Associate of Applied Science in Graphic Design: Students from NWACC with a completed AAS in Graphic Design may apply directly to the BFA in Graphic Design. If accepted, students will enter the program in year three. Students will apply directly through the [school of art](#) (in addition to their university application) and are responsible for letting their academic advisor know if they are applying through this program. Prospective applicants who have questions about the program should reach out to Donna Smith Jones, the Director of Recruitment and Outreach for the School of Art. Transfer students who do not have a completed AAS in Graphic Design from NWACC may still apply for the Graphic Design BFA, but if accepted will begin the program in year two.
