Degree Breakdown:

University Core + Major Requirements + General Electives = **120** total hours

University Core: (Typically 35 hours) These options are listed on the first page of this work sheet

Major Requirements: (Up to 47 hours) These are the courses specifically required by the department to complete a degree and are listed above.

General Electives: (Varies by major) These courses make up the difference to reach 120 total hours beyond University Core and Major Requirements. These courses must be 1000 level or higher (in some cases, 3000 level or higher), courses not already required, and courses you do not have previous credit for. These courses are great to use for other majors and minors.

Fulbright Writing Requirement: Each Fulbright graduate must complete a writing requirement to graduate. Each academic department may meet this requirement in a different way, so make sure you work with your advisor for specifics.

Online courses: Students in on-campus degree programs are allowed to take online sections reserved for on-campus students. However, only 35% of a student's courses taken at the University of Arkansas may be online. See catalog for official policy.

GPA: Every student must have at least a 2.00 **cumulative** grade point average to be eligible to graduate from the University of Arkansas.

24, 30, and 40 Hour Rules:

Also known as residency requirements, these hours can come from major/minors. Courses can count for each rule met.

24 Hour Rule:

Students must complete at least 24 hours of 3000+ level classes in the Fulbright College.

30 Hour Rule:

Students must complete at least 30 hours of 3000+ level classes at the University of Arkansas.

40 Hour Rule:

Students must complete at least 40 hours of 3000+ level classes in total, including transfer courses. Courses that are 2000 level and have a pre-requisite may also count for this rule.
