Transfer Coursework Restriction: At least 50% of a student's Arts and Sciences (ARSC) major or minor must be taken at the University of Arkansas.

Note about the degree audit: The department of Anthropology offers a large number of special topics classes that may count in different categories depending on the topic. Additionally, some classes are approved to count in more than one category. Students may need to request assistance from their academic advisor to adjust their degree audit to match where they intend a class to count.

GPA (Grade Point Average): Every student must have at least a 2.00 cumulative grade point average to be eligible to graduate from the University of Arkansas.
