Transfer Coursework Restriction: At least 50% of a student's Arts and Sciences (ARSC) major or minor must be taken at the University of Arkansas.

GPA (Grade Point Average): Every student must have at least a 2.00 cumulative grade point average to be eligible to graduate from the University of Arkansas.

BFA Applications: Students must apply to and be accepted to a BFA in Art Education design through the school of art. (prior to acceptance, they will be declared in the STARBA major.) Students must be enrolled in or done with ARTS 1929 to be eligible to apply. Graduation Timeline: The Art Education BFA in K-12 Teaching is a **9-semester** (4.5 year) degree plan that includes 1 semester of student teaching. Students will also earn more than 120 hours.
