Additionally, In order to receive a B.A. in English from the University of Arkansas, a student must complete at least 24 credit hours in ENGL courses numbered 3000-level or higher from the English department.

<u>GPA (Grade Point Average)</u>: Every student must have at least a 2.00 cumulative grade point average to be eligible to graduate from the University of Arkansas.
