EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

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• Numbers. It is estimated that on any given night approximately 1170 adults and youth in the Northwest Arkansas area (Washington & Benton counties) are homeless (see Table 1). This figure is based on: (a) a 24-hour point-in-time count of 308 homeless persons conducted January 25-26, 2007. There were 308 face-to-face interviews and an additional 59 accompanied youth under 18 years of age with those being interviewed; (b) an estimated 162 homeless persons living in inaccessible places, such as abandoned buildings and/or doubling up with friends and relatives. The number in (b) is based on projections from the survey/count in soup kitchens, day shelters, and food banks; (c) 442 school-age youth in grades K-12. These numbers were provided by all the school districts in Washington and Benton counties. This 442 number is arrived at after subtracting the school age youth that were either interviewed as part of the 308 (23 school-age youth staying at three Youth Bridge shelters), or those school-age children (27) that were included in the 59 whose parents listed them as accompanied minors in the survey; and finally (d) 199 parents of children who are reported by the school districts as doubling up. This number is an estimate based on the assumption that for every two school children reported by the system as doubling up (397), there was one parent/legal guardian.

The total number of observed and estimated "invisible" homeless persons is 1170. This number represents a reliable benchmark for discussing the number of homeless adults and children currently living in Washington and Benton counties. This number represents an increase from previously released estimates because <u>all</u> of the school districts have now been included in the count, not just the large city school districts, and an additional estimate of "invisible" parents/guardians (199) was added to the aggregate figure.

The summary below only pertains to the 308 homeless adults and youth that were part of the face-to-face interviews for the PIT.

• Basic demographics. The median age of respondents was 34 years and the mean age was 34.4 years (see Table 2). If we remove the 32 youth who were interviewed at the three Youth Bridge shelters, the median age increases slightly to 36 years of age. Almost two-thirds of the sample, (63%) was between the ages of 25 and 54. Men comprised 61% of the survey respondents. Eighty-four percent of respondents were Caucasian/White, eight percent were African-American/Black, with the remaining eight percent comprised of other race/ethnic categories; 4.5% of respondents were Hispanic (see Tables 3 & 4).

- Military service. Of the 296 respondents answering this question, 44 (14.9%) had spent time in the military (see Table 33). Broken out by gender, this was approximately 20% of all men (n = 32) and 7% of women (n = 8).
- **Family.** Sixty-seven percent of homeless persons were unaccompanied adults (see Table 5). Of those in families, 5% were couples without children, 6% were couples with children, 21% were one parent families with children, and 1% was in some other family arrangement.
- Place of residence. While fewer than 2% of respondents were actually interviewed on the streets, soup kitchen interviews revealed that overall 8% of respondents actually spent the previous night on the streets. The most common living situations included emergency shelter (41%), transitional housing (13%), doubling up/staying with a friend or relative (17%), and treatment facilities (16%). Information that examines recent living situations—where the respondent resided the most over the past seven days—presents numbers closely paralleling those reported for the previous night (see Tables 9 & 10).
- **Time spent homeless.** The median time spent homeless was 3 months. Thirty percent were homeless one month or less. Seventy-five percent were homeless 9 months or less; and 94% were homeless for less than 2 years. Forty-eight percent reported that this was their first time being homeless in the last three years (see Table 11).
- Chronic homelessness: 21% percent of respondents were chronically homeless. HUD defines a person as chronically homeless if they are an unaccompanied adult, with a disability, and either have been homeless for the last 12 months consecutively or had four or more episodes of homelessness in the last 3 years. If we remove the constraining factor of unaccompanied adult (thus including women with children) and re-estimate chronicity, the percentage increases to 32%.
- **Services used and service gaps.** The most frequently <u>received</u> services were food assistance (53%), emergency shelter (43%), substance abuse treatment (38%), clothing assistance (34%), case management (27%), mental health services (25%), and medication assistance (23%). The median number of services reported being used was 3 (see Tables 13 & 14).
 - Regarding service gaps, the services most commonly needed, but <u>not currently being received</u> were: job training and assistance (35%), transportation assistance (30%), housing placement assistance (31%), transitional housing (29%), permanent supportive housing (26%), case management assistance (25%), and medication assistance (19%). The median number of services needed but not received was 3 (see Tables 15 & 16).
- HUD special needs/ disability categories. Of the number of respondents, 73 percent (206) reported some special need or disability (this excludes youths). Forty-four percent of survey respondents classified themselves as chronic substance abusers, 21% of respondents reported having a mental illness, 15% reported a physical disability, 1% had HIV/AIDS, 12% were domestic violence victims, and 5% had a developmental disability. Of the total number of homeless persons, nearly 20% reported two or more of these conditions. Of those with special conditions, approximately 67% were receiving services, treatment, or a bed related to their condition(s) (see Tables 17 & 18)

• **Gender differences.** Homeless men were generally older than homeless women (a median age of 38 years for men compared to 31 years for women) (see Table 19). Because women had a much greater probability of being in a one-parent family arrangement (40% versus 9%) they were also more likely to be accompanied by children (see Table 21). Men were more than twice as likely to reside on the streets (11% to 4%). (see Tables 23 & 24)

In general, men average longer amounts of time homeless (see Table 25). However, fewer men (42%) reported experiencing homelessness for the first time compared to women (58%). (see Table 26).

Women reported receiving an average (median) of 4 services, while men reported receiving an average of 3. The greatest differences in services received between women and men were: case management (41% for women versus 18% for men), medication assistance (33% versus 17%), medical assistance (23% versus 14%) and life skills training (27% versus 13%). The greatest gender differences in unmet needs were: child care assistance (23% of women expressed unmet needs versus 5% of men), job training (42% of women versus 33% of men) and transitional housing (37% of men versus 24% of women). In general, higher percentages of men reported needing services that were not being received (see Tables 27-30).

Men were more likely to classify themselves as substance abusers (49% to 39% for women), while women were more likely to classify themselves as victims of domestic violence (27% to 3% for men). (see Table 31)

• Homeless individuals versus those with family members present. A comparison of homeless persons who were alone, to those who were accompanied by family members reveals differences closely matching those found between men and women. This reflects the fact that the most common family grouping was a woman with children. (see Tables 34-47).

Overview: Objectives and Methods of the Survey

The results of the count and survey are used by Northwest Arkansas Housing Coalition and the cities of Bentonville, Springdale, and Rogers to procure funding, make long range planning efforts, promote education on homeless issues, advocate for the homeless, and identify gaps in services so that needs may be addressed appropriately.

The Questionnaire and Date of Administration. The survey was a point-in-time assessment (point prevalence count) conducted over a 24-hour period, from 11AM January 25, 2007 until 11AM January 26, 2007. The instrument we used had 20 questions designed to fit HUD based data requirements. The questionnaire that we used was patterned after one used by Unity, the New Orleans Continuum of Care, and Birmingham's Metropolitan Services for the Homeless. It was modified slightly to address the particular needs of the Northwest Arkansas Housing Coalition's Continuum of Care plan. The outline of the table of contents provides an overview of the topic areas covered by the 2007 questionnaire. The entire questionnaire appears as Appendix A.

A fine-grained portrait of the homeless will be developed later this year from an in-depth one-hour survey of homeless to be conducted in March and April 2007. Because of the very detailed information provided by that second survey, the volume of questions asked in the point-in-time survey was limited.

Identification of Locations. In Washington and Benton counties, Arkansas, all school districts, shelters and homeless service providers that could be identified were asked to participate in the count and survey. It is believed that all eligible service agencies participated this year, except for one. Only those agencies directly involved with providing services for the homeless were solicited. Participation from mainstream agencies such as the Crisis Center, DHR, the Housing Authorities, and other entities whose main constituencies are permanently housed individuals was not solicited. In addition, we did not administer surveys in jails or hospital emergency rooms.

Volunteer Interviewers. The questionnaire was administered by trained volunteers, including college students, service providers, police officers, and community residents. On the evening before the survey, January 24, 2007 volunteers attended a two-hour training session held on the U of A campus. At that session, volunteers learned about basic interviewing procedures, the necessity of the survey and the relevance of questions. In addition, volunteers role-played the survey instrument and were instructed on how to approach people for interviewing, and how to remain safe while conducting surveys in new and unfamiliar environments. Finally, all volunteers were assigned to team captains, and specific enumeration sites and time slots during which interviews were to be conducted.

Interview Times. Soup kitchens and food banks (Central United Methodist, Salvation Army-Springdale, Bread of Life, etc.) were surveyed between 11am and 1pm on January 25, 2007; day shelters were enumerated between 1 and 3pm, January 25, 2007 and 11 to 1pm January 26, 2007. Night shelters were enumerated between 7 and 9pm on January 25, 2007. Street sites were enumerated from 7-9pm on January 25, 2007 in Springdale and from 6 to 8 am on January 26, 2007 in Fayetteville. Seven unsheltered sites were visited during the morning of the 25th in Fayetteville. Those sites were pre-determined by Fayetteville's Police Department who provided escorts for the unsheltered census teams.

Volunteers were instructed to administer the questions themselves. However, certain shelters, requested to do the surveys themselves. In those instances, service providers trained on January 24 and gave general instructions to clients, allowing the respondent to complete the questionnaire alone. In several large facilities, and in many transitional shelters where respondents had jobs, this was the only way that individuals could effectively be counted during the 24-hour period. Surveys were then gathered

the next day. As can be seen in Appendix A, the questionnaire is designed so that it can either be administered by an interviewer or filled out as a survey.

Eliminating Duplications. In addition, at the beginning of the survey, volunteers asked each potential participant if they had "done this survey" already in the 24-hour period. The distinctive yellow color of the survey form facilitated clarity. Upon recognizing it, participants appeared eager to refuse if they had previously completed the survey, suggesting that any double-count would be incidental. To identify and eliminate double-counts, however, respondents were asked their initials and ages. Double-counts were assessed by matching initials, ages, and other parallel information, such as race. Another concern was the double reporting of children, when both parents were surveyed. We also obtained initials, ages, and locations of children and others who accompanied a respondent. In both cases, we found no evidence of duplication in this 24-hour count.

Screening of Housed Persons. Question #5 on the questionnaire was the primary way of screening housed from non-housed persons. Occasionally interviews were administered to persons who, from the information provided, were determined to have places of their own. These responses were not included in the final count. The 308 homeless persons counted were face-to-face interviews representing only those persons who are clearly without their own housing.

Additional Methodological Notes:

- 1. While some sites such as jails, hospitals, and outlying rural areas were not enumerated, and while some questions had missing cases, the sample (308) essentially constitutes a point-in-time population of "highly visible" homeless persons in Washington and Benton counties.
 - The 308 count sample does not include homeless persons who are <u>not</u> readily accessible to service providers. For example, except for some who were surveyed at soup kitchens and day shelters, the survey does not include persons or families doubling up with friends or relatives, living in motels or hotels, living in abandoned buildings, campgrounds, etc. We provide two estimates of the "less visible" (see Table 1) adult homeless by using numbers provided by the school districts of accompanied children doubling up with friends and relatives, and a projected number based on the proportion of those who were counted at soup kitchens and day shelters who said they had spent most of the last week doubling up with friends and relatives.
- 2. The figures reporting overall and in-group comparisons (such as men to women) are low estimates. In an effort to maximize participation and to account for distractions (e.g., the rush of activity in a soup kitchen), volunteers were instructed on a variety of ways in which to administer the survey. Some respondents were handed the survey and completed it on their own. Their levels of reading comprehension, patience, and distractions of varying degrees likely influenced their responses and the extent to which they completed the questions. Most respondents were interviewed directly by volunteers. The challenges of interviewing a highly mobile population resulted in some missing cases. The number of respondents completing a particular question varied. Because of the variation in responses by question, care was taken in the tables to note the sample sizes ("N") to which a table's figures apply.
